The roles of the museum are to collect, preserve study, interpret museum objects and provide public access to natural and cultural materials.

### **Arend Dieperink Museum**

The museum is situated on the Thabo Mbeki Road in Mokopane. The museum is housed in old stone school that was completed in 1917. The museum houses an outstanding collection of Sotho and Voortrekker artefacts, the latter being the largest collection of its kind in the Bushveld. The entrance fee is R3.00 adults and R1.00 for school children. For bookings, contact 015 491 9735.

### **The Polokwane Museum**

The museum is located at cnr Thabo Mbeki and Market Street. The story of this green building started in 1886 when J.H Moschke decided to start a business on the corner of Vorster and market street in Polokwane. In 1906 a fire destroyed the whole of the Market Street as well as Moschke's shop. Moschke imported a prefabricated steel structure from Germany with which he rebuilt his shop. Today is a museum that portrays the local history of Limpopo.

The museum is opened 8H00 to 4H00 from Monday to Friday. Closed on weekends and public holidays
