In fact- you will grow up to work to end this violence against women and children. *Makgarebe ga a bethwe. Le ga tee. Le go rogwa, ga ba rogwe.* There are better ways to win an argument-hence we have debating teams in schools. They debate their differences away.

One of the fundamental pillars of government's immediate plan to end this scourge of gender based violence and fermicide is to prevent it from happening. I know that you will have a different outlook as you grow and ensure that no woman is killed just because they are a woman.

GBV doesn't only happen to girls, but boys as well. Should you experience any treatment inconsistent with how you would like to be treated- report it immediately to law enforcers.

Ladies and gentleman. I also use this opportunity to challenge officials of our department.

I would like to see more young persons with disabilities also being part of this remarkable events. Persons with disabilities are also part of our province- and we need to render our outmost support to them and their families. Next year- let us ensure that more programmes are tailor made for them to also enjoy and learn.

As I conclude, I reiterate that you are not only here to play- but to learn. You are here to learn to be better people in our society, leadt it in the future- and serve it with distinction when the need will be arising. Continue being disciplined- and all the best for the next few days.
